## POCKET MONEY: SUGGESTED SPENDING MONEY/COST OF LIVING

EC does not provide a pocket money service. Parents should ensure their children have sufficient pocket money for the duration of their stay. EC Toronto recommends an average budget of CAD 70 per week. Should students require more pocket money during their stay, parents are asked to transfer funds through an international transfer service.

# Meals

Students receive 3 meals per day. All breakfasts, some lunches and dinners are served at the residence. Students enjoy healthy meal choices. There is a vegetarian option with every meal.

## BREAKFAST

Full buffet with hot and cold breakfast.

## LUNCH

Buffet or special ordered in lunches or packed picnic lunches.

## DINNER

Full buffet. Students are also taken as a group to a popular restaurant, for example, Hard Rock Café or an ethnic neighbourhood to enjoy the local cuisine (Greektown, Chinatown).

## DIETARY REQUIREMENTS

If students have specific diet requirements (e.g. Gluten free / vegetarian / Halal), EC must be informed of this prior to the student's arrival.

*Please note:* For gluten-free meals a supplement may apply.

## MEDICAL

EC must be advised upon booking of any medical conditions, allergies or medication that needs to be administered to students.

Medical insurance is included for students on our young learner programmes in Canada. We have created a special insurance policy with trusted insurance provider *guard.me* to ensure that students are covered while studying abroad, and for parents to feel confident that their children are protected and secure. This insurance will cover students for accidents and emergency illness up to a maximum of \$2,000,000 CDN. This policy covers students without excesses or co-insurance.

It is extremely important that upon booking, a contact email address is provided. Within 24 hours the student will receive confirmation of the policy and within 48 hours a card will arrive via email. This should be printed out and carried with the student as proof of insurance protection. A mobile phone app is also available for students to have easy access to their policy at all times.

# Learning Centre

Lessons take place in downtown Toronto, at 89 Chestnut which is a University of Toronto property. The facility is centrally located right behind City Hall and within a few minutes' walk to the Eaton Centre. All downtown tourist attractions, such as the CN Tower are easily reached on foot or a few minutes of transit.

## Course: General English

20 lessons per week (a total of 15 hours)  
1 lesson = 45 minutes

- Lessons are engaging and designed especially for young learners. Teachers aim to satisfy any interest, with a focus on communication to boost students' confidence when using English in practical situations. Regular tests and conversation classes help to ensure that students improve their English as much as possible.
- The course will develop students' English language skills by integrating the key areas of reading, writing, speaking and listening.
- Activities are led by and closely supervised by EC Monitors

## Academic Rules

- Attendance in class is mandatory. If students are sick they must notify the school immediately.
- Punctuality is mandatory
- All classes begin promptly at 9.00am
- English is the only language spoken at school and in the classes
- Students must respect their fellow students' cultural and ethnic background. Intolerance, harassment or discrimination is not tolerated.
- Food and drink is not permitted in the classroom or in the computer room.

## FIRST DAY

At breakfast, Classic students are gathered together to go to the Office by 8.45am to begin testing and attend their first day information session. After evaluation, registration and orientation, students will be taken on a tour of the campus. Students begin their programme on the first day.

Students are to bring their passport and flight ticket to school on the first day.

Students will receive information regarding insurance and transportation in Toronto on their first day at school. They are not to purchase a metro pass on their arrival weekend.

## ATTENDANCE

All students must attend classes on a daily basis unless they are genuinely indisposed (due to illness, for example). If students are unable to attend class they must advise EC staff.

- For every 2-week booking, 2 full-day weekend excursions are included. Students may choose to participate in one excursion on their arrival weekend (on Sunday) in which case EC staff needs to be notified upon arrival, and another excursion at the end of their first week (Saturday or Sunday). Alternatively, students can rest on their first Sunday after arrival, and then participate in their 2 full-day excursions on Saturday and Sunday at the end of their first week.

# Welfare, Rules and Disciplinary Action

## CURFEW TIMES

- Standard curfew time is 10pm on weeknights
- Standard curfew time is 11pm on weekends
- A curfew form is required to be signed by the parents and the students.

## ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION

The legal drinking age in Ontario is 19 years. It is illegal for all students attending this course to consume alcohol, have someone buy alcohol on their behalf or visit bars/clubs.

## DRUGS

Using drugs, being under the influence of drugs or possessing drugs is illegal. Under no circumstances should students use, possess or be under the influence of drugs.

## SMOKING

The legal age to buy tobacco is 19 years. It is illegal to buy tobacco or have someone buy tobacco on the student's behalf if they are under the legal smoking age.

## CUSTOMER COMPLAINTS

At EC, we endeavour to provide our students with the highest possible level of service. If, however, a student is unsatisfied with any aspect of their programme with EC, we ask that they inform us immediately. Most problems are small and can be quickly resolved by our staff members. During the first week of school, all students are given an Initial Course Evaluation form, in which they are asked to evaluate various aspects of their stay, such as tuition, accommodation and leisure. The form also allows students the opportunity to bring to our attention anything that is not to their satisfaction should they feel unable to speak to us directly. Solutions to any issues will be provided and all necessary parties will be notified when applicable. Students are also requested to complete an End of Course Evaluation form at the end of their stay such that they have the opportunity to provide EC with general feedback before returning to their home country.

## ACCOMMODATION RULES

- Overnight guests are strictly forbidden. Students may not visit the rooms of the opposite gender. The residence has common lounges for students to meet.
- The residence supervisor will check rooms periodically. Students must keep their rooms neat and tidy.
- Students committing any act or behaviour that jeopardizes the safety and well-being of other students or staff will not be tolerated.
- Students cannot consume any type of alcoholic beverage, illegal drug or narcotic. The police will be called and students will be dismissed immediately without a refund.
- Students will be required to pay for any damage to residence property.

## False ID

Being in possession of false identification is fraud and is illegal in Canada.

## Course Certificate

Students must attend all lessons and organised activities in order to receive their End of Course Certificate

## Parent's Permission

Parents/guardians must sign the Young Student Waiver giving emergency details, and their consent and permission for their child to receive medical treatment and attend activities.

## Extra nights

Extra nights may be available at an additional fee, all requests are subject to availability.

## Visa Requirements

Students are asked to check with the Canadian embassy whether they require a visa to enter Canada before they submit their application. Further details will be provided on request.

## EXPULSION

Failure to follow any of the above rules will result in immediate expulsion from the TLA programme with no refund. Students' parents will be notified immediately and sent home at their own expense. Depending on the severity of the situation, breaking any of the above rules may result in a monetary fine, arrest, jail sentence or deportation by the Canadian police.
